





Dojo account for students to enjoy. Her flexibility to support our school community during COVID-19 has not gone unnoticed. Thank you for all that you do Tina!


CARMAN COLLEGIATE

There are many challenges in learning from home. Brenda Mutcher, grade 6 teacher from Carman stated that, "Although we don't get to interact in the usual way, it is comforting to maintain a sense of community online and it's wonderful to see all their faces. I look forward to seeing my class every morning."

The first few weeks was a big adjustment for students. They needed to remember that they will need to treat the days of the week like a regular school week. They will need to be up and ready to work. They need to keep a routine to help them adjust to learning from home.

Teachers understand that students are also juggling commitments with family, and some are helping around the house with siblings, they are trying to be flexible in assisting students. Mutcher said, "I believe teachers are being mindful that this is a tricky time for kids and don't want to overwhelm them, but we are still expecting them to continue with their academic responsibilities. Next year will be a challenge for some if they are unable to continue their learning from home."

To ensure curricular outcomes are achieved even during this home learning time, Mutcher and her grade 6 colleagues meet daily to collaborate and develop online tools to help support and guide students through their learning. They are available to have video chats



and coach students through their trouble areas throughout the school day. She feels that literacy and numeracy outcomes are crucial in ensuring that students are on track for their upcoming school year. Mutcher encourages her students to check books out at the Boyne Library now that it is available and to continue to read all summer!

Mutcher, like her colleagues, understand that this is a tricky time for families. She said the support from parents has been positive. They are working hard to help their child during this challenging time.

Even though she would never want to extend this virtual learning time, Mutcher said she is grateful for the collaborative learning opportunities, the new experiences, and technology that are available to make it easier to do her teaching from home.
